Servanthood

Put on the apron of humility, to serve one another. (I Peter 5:5)

The passage I chose for this week is a beautiful passage for this time of year. The Fall seems to be a time people love to serve at their church, school, local food pantry, or wherever. Our theme for the school year is "**Connected**," and it fits beautifully with the idea of **servanthood**. We can serve our God in numerous ways, in fact, we can serve Him in ALL things. FROM THE PASTOR

Romans 1:16-17 For I am not ashamed of the gospel, for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes, to the Jesu first and also to the Greek. For in it the righteousness of God is revealed from faith for faith.

Happy Reformation Day

Happy Reformation day! Yes we are celebrating Halloween this weekend. The kids will be dressing up, and getting sugar highs. We will be getting our steps in as we go from house to house. It is a truly wonderful time! However this weekend we are also celebrating Reformation Day. This is the day that Martin Luther nailed the 95 thesis onto the doorpost of the Catholic Church announcing its corruption at the time.

What was the corruption? The corruption was simply the idea that we had to earn our salvation. The Church at the time used guilt and fear to manipulate people to pay money to make it out of heaven. They took advantage of the fact that the people did not have the Bible in their own language to see the truth of the Gospel. So people paid money for indulgences to get out of purgatory. They would make pilgrimages to visit holy relics, to gain more grace. God was a scary God who needed us to earn his favor. He was a distant God who did not care for the plight of his people, but actually became an increased burden upon them.

Martin Luther was terrified of God because he was terrified of his sins. He also made the pilgrimage; he also sought to earn God's favor. But after becoming a monk he was actually able to study the Bible and see what it actually said. He discovered that the Gospel was not for those who did the right things; it was not for those with enough money. The Gospel of Jesus' death and resurrection for the forgiveness of sins was for all people, and it could be received merely by believing in it. God was not and is not distant- nor is he an added burden. He is our strength and our refuge, a very present help in times of trouble. (Psalm 46:1). He comes to his burdened people and relieves them of the guilt of sin. He helps his people live as he desires, and forgives them when they fail. He loves his people and wants them to know his love.

Suddenly Martin Luther was not afraid of God anymore, and he realized we didn't have to be either. Our God is a God of mercy and love. He wanted the whole world to know it and therefore posted what he discovered on the front doors of the church. Soon the Bible would be translated and distributed so that all people could know the Gospel and the truth of God's love.

This is what we celebrate this weekend- the rediscovery of the Gospel. We give thanks to God that he so desires us to know him, that he raised up Martin Luther so that the Gospel could be proclaimed to us. So while you are out trick or treating, as you go from door to door, find someone who might need to hear this message as well. Life can be a burden. But there is a God who wants to relieve the burdens of life and be present with his people. So carry on the reformation Spirit and proclaim the wonders of the Gospel to the people of your neighborhood.
